RE: H.R. 4601, "The Seasonal Agriculture CDL Modernization Act"

Dear Chair Graves, Ranking Member Larsen, Subcommittee Chair Rouzer, and Subcommittee Ranking Member Norton:

We, the undersigned agribusiness organizations, write to request your support for legislation sponsored by Rep. Tracey Mann that provides important modern updates to the Farm-Related Restricted Commercial Driver's License (or "Seasonal Ag CDL") program. These measures are critical to the continued success and viability of the agricultural industry, which feeds our country and is the economic backbone of rural communities across the United States. Current cosponsors include Representatives Jeff Hurd, Ron Estes, Randy Feenstra, Brad Finstad, Mark Messmer, Derek Schmidt, Buddy Carter, Troy Nehls, Jack Berman, John Rose, Adrian Smith, Mike Flood, David Kustoff, Craig Goldman, Julia Letlow, Ronny Jackson, Tim Burchett, Bruce Westerman, Nathaniel Moran, and Austin Scott.

Farm-related service industries include farm retail outlets and suppliers, agrichemical businesses, custom harvesters, and livestock feeders. These industries provide essential products and services to American farmers, provide well-paying jobs for their rural communities, and contribute billions to the U.S. economy. Seasonal Ag CDL drivers are hired for "just in time" delivery of agricultural products during "peak seasons" with many of these employees being retired farmers, farm workers, or college students raised on a farm with experience operating heavy agricultural equipment. Our industries cannot afford the overhead of maintaining an exclusive workforce of full-time commercial drivers due to the seasonal nature of agricultural production and transportation is incidental to the primary business purpose of agriculture. To address safety concerns, only drivers with a clean driving record (i.e. no convictions for any type of motor vehicle) are eligible to receive a farm-related restricted CDL. Additionally, these drivers must have held a motor vehicle license for at least one year, be medically qualified, included in drug/alcohol testing programs, and complete a driver qualification file. These drivers are only allowed to operate within 150 mile-radius of the place of business or the farm currently being served and no hazardous materials endorsements are allowed.

The proposed legislation aims to modernize and simplify regulations for farm-related industries by authorizing online renewal of Seasonal Ag CDLs. Additionally, it seeks to provide clarity and relief by codifying that implements of husbandry are not classified as commercial motor vehicles and do

not contribute to the Gross Combination Vehicle Weight Rating (GCVWR) or Gross Combination Weight (GCW).

The bill proposes the authorization of online renewal for Seasonal Ag CDLs. This initiative is designed to:

- Streamline the renewal process, saving time and resources for drivers and state agencies.
- Enhance accessibility, particularly for individuals in rural areas who may face challenges visiting renewal centers physically.
- Support the agricultural sector by reducing administrative burdens, allowing drivers to focus on essential farming and transportation activities.

Under the legislation, implements of husbandry—equipment specifically designed for farm use—will not be classified as commercial motor vehicles, as is long standing Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration policy to ensure more durable regulations for our industry. The purpose of this provision is to:

- Ensure that such equipment does not contribute to GCVWR or GCW calculations, simplifying compliance with commercial vehicle weight regulations.
- Protect farm-related service industries from unnecessary restrictions or penalties related to the transportation of agricultural related equipment.
- Encourage the efficient operation and mobility of agricultural implements, supporting productivity in farm operations.

Congress has made efforts in the past to modernize the Seasonal Ag CDL program. In 2022, Congress amended the Seasonal Ag CDL program to accommodate changing agricultural production seasons by creating a 210-day operating window and renewing the 12-month service period at the beginning of each year. The additional changes in this bill are necessary to help farmers and agribusinesses continue to operate, ensuring our safe, healthy, and plentiful food supply, and aiding rural communities amid rising input costs, low commodity prices, and changing climate conditions. We urge support for this legislation that will benefit all stakeholders in the agricultural industry.
